
Freedman Bureau School

Your kind letter of Nov 3d is received and the poor Freedmen wept for joy at the hope it expressed I question who owns the building and is the title a good one

The Freedmen have by Contributed Money and labors Secured it New and good 2d I was commissioned by the N F Aid but they withdrew their aid last Spring the pupils who are able pay and the sons of Relief pay me part tuition for persons not able top au and I throw off half these as no one been excluded on a count of poverty 3d At least one hundred good pupils can be had if I can have a good house 4th My estimate of \$273 does not include labors it is to procure materials 5th The Freedmen are very poor and unable to work for nothing yet they instruct my to say by endeavoring some [[?]] they can build the House and they will not ask for any more than the 273 dollars If some compensation was granted it would be thankfully Received 6th I will teach the school this winter If I have a house and life and health is spared PS The Freedmen can get a good sight with a good title

and when I say one hundred pupils I put it at the lowest estimate and Mr Burt if you could get me some School Books and common paper at a cheap rate it would help the poor children. Paper the poorest kind is not less than two cents per sheet and steel pens are in uprising prices I trust what is done will be done soon our best pupils are a bout shong their fall work and anxious to go to school Mr Burt one [[strikethrough]] H [[/strikethrough]] Honable Arnold will hand you this he wants to get advice about secureing a child from a nocount mother Please let me know the result soon

I am instructed by Gen Lewis to direct you to visit Athens & investigated the case laid before us through you by this Mrs. Truesdale.

The points on which I want accurate information are

- 1. Do the colored people own a lot on which there is a building that can be repaired & made suitable for school? It seems from Mrs. Truesdales letter that she is asking us to build a new building. We have no authority to do this. But if they can secure a frame with a roof on it, we can fit it up. Or we can do any work of the kind of a shell of a building, if it can come under the head of repairs. If this plan cannot be adopted,
- 2. Can a building be rented for one year which we can repair arranging that the repairs shall be applied on the rent?
- 4. If the Freedmen own the lot, is there title good?



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but any teacher of freedmen was subject to abuse.

One of the earliest points of attack against freedmen's schools was in East Tennessee, where a general repugnance existed toward the Negro, slave or free. The teacher of the United Presbyterian Mission school in Greenville reacted to the threat of violence against him by closing his school and going to Knoxville. 198 At Athens, Mrs. Mary E. Truesdell, teacher of a freedmen's school, reported that her schoolhouse was burned by enemies on December 26, 1865. A second building was erected, and it also was destroyed by fire, but she said this might have resulted from accident. In 1867, David Burt referred to Mrs. Truesdell, who was then in her third building, as an "invincible woman." 199 Strangely, in 1868, when prejudice was at its height in other parts of the state, Samuel Walker, Bureau agent, reported that in the Knoxville district there was little prejudice toward the establishment of Negro schools. 200

In the fall of 1865, Fisk optimistically believed that the white Southern hostility toward freedmen's
